Not long after the show's original premiere, he was tried and convicted for "gross indecency". For that reason, I find this show isn't so much a passion project but a project of necessity. This show should be seen by masses as much as possible for its genius and relevancy and humor. This show may be over a century old, but it is far from outdated. Current undertones of society and class remain as real now as they did back in the 1890's.

The cast assembled for this project is stellar. Each of the nine people on stage have created their own versions of their characters instead of caricatures. You probably noticed that the role of Lady Bracknell is played by a man. Why would I do this? It was not to take any role away from the talented pool of women. This is not a "drag" performance either. Lady Bracknell has a tradition of being played by a man. The character is first and foremost a symbol of Victorian earnestness. Bracknell represents Wilde's opinion of Victorian upper-class negativity, conservative and repressive values, and power. Bracknell is not the only char acter to represent a certain class as you will see in this performance.

Finally I will say this. Prepare to laugh and bask in the absurdity and satire to Victorian manners and celebration of style over substance. This expertly constructed farce combined with the actors and designers at the top of their game have created a ravishing and silly evening of fun. I know you'll love what they've done.

BOX OFFICE TIPS FOR OUR SEASON SUBSCRIBERS

First of all, thank you for rolling with our first season with reserved seats! We've had a few hiccups along the way, but we are learning as we go.

Here are a few "tips" to help you navigate the ticketing process:

• If you try to redeem your passes online, do not stop because there is a price on the tickets in your cart! Follow the prompts to the final checkout screen. If you have logged in with your email to your account, that screen includes a blue "Apply" button to apply your passes to your cart. (You may need to scroll down.) Click it, you will view the history of your pass use, then click to continue, and the price on the tickets should now be zero! Complete the transaction, and you will be good to go!

• If you book online, be sure to select your delivery method (Print at home or Will Call). If you print at home, you do not need to stand in line at the box office.

The unexpected arrival of her cousin Elain, a former Miss Firecracker winner, (who has walked out on her rich but boring husband and her two small children) complicates matters a bit, as does the repeated threat of Elain's eccentric brother, Delmount, (recently released from a mental institution) to sell the family homestead and decamp for New Orleans. But, aided by a touchingly awkward seamstress named Popeye (who is hopelessly smitten by Delmount) and several other cheerfully nutty characters, Carnelle perseveres—leading to a denouement of unparalleled hilarity, compassion and moving lyricism as all concerned finally escape their unhappy pasts and turn hopefully toward what must surely be a better future. CARNELLE SCOTT: 20s, the beauty contestant POPEYE JACKSON: 20s-30s, Carnelle's seamstress ELAIN RUTLEDGE: 30s, Carnelle's first cousin; a beauty DELMOUNT WILLIAMS: 20s-30s, Carnelle's first cousin; Elain's brother MAC SAM: 20s-30s, the balloon man TESSY MAHONEY: 20s-30s, the beauty contest coordinator



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
